GFWC Clearwater Community Woman's Club History

1971

The Clearwater Community Woman's Club was **organized May 13, 1971** from the Community Life Department of the Woman's Club of Clearwater by former Clearwater Junior Woman's Club members. Sixty-one women formed the membership. Officers were: President – Shirley Tobias; First Vice President – Jan Mace Monroe; Second Vice-President-Joan Wyatt; Third Vice President – J'Anne Moon; Recording Secretary – Alice Thalheimer; Corresponding Secretary – Marian Dunn; Treasurer-Betty Garrett; Member-at-Large – Mrs. Richard Davies.

September 21, 1971, the Clearwater Community Woman's Club became a federated club of the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs and the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

The first community project was **Parental Awareness Responsibility (PAR)** a drug rehabilitation hospital. Also, work was begun at **Antwin, Inc.**, a gift shop and employment for senior citizens.

1972

On **February** 29, the first fundraiser, a champagne brunch was held at Innisbrook. At that time, the first "Daisy Award" was presented to the **Pinellas Youth Symphony**. This award is presented to a local organization for outstanding support in the community. The award winner is a secret until the presentation.

1973

The project of distributing Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets to the needy was begun. **Project Cheer**, the wrapping of Christmas gifts for Mental Health began in December.

1974

"Send a Mouse to College" drive, which aids cancer research, was begun by CCWC. (It continued into 1976.) This was a project for students only to contribute 51 cents each. Members presented programs in the schools to introduce the project. \$3,080.45 was raised.

1975

On **July** 21st, club members participated in a fundraiser as hostesses at the Preview of the new **Maas Brothers** store in Countryside Mall. Club members also participated as hostesses at a Preview of the new **Burdine's** store in Clearwater Mall on September 16th. This was also a champagne breakfast. The club earned \$5,025 for the day's activities. This money was set aside for a special project.

The **BETSI** (**Breast Examination Through Self Instruction**) was begun. The club purchased four educational tools known as BETSI's. Club members used these to instruct organizations requesting a program. Members also presented programs in middle and high schools. Material on how to answer question was supplied by the American Cancer Society.

1976

"Getting Down to Basics" was a woman's forum sponsored by CCWC, AAUW and Hadassah. (The name in later years was changed to "Back to Basics".) The first forum began on March 3rd.

In **April**, five Junior League members and six CCWC members traveled to the University of Florida in Gainesville for an intensive course on the basics of historical inventories. This group documented the buildings in the inner core of downtown Clearwater. The group was incorporated as **"Volunteers in Preservation"**. Later, an historic documentation of Clearwater before 1940 was written and photographed.

In cooperation with Burdines, CCWC presented an exhibit by the local artist, **Harry Stowers**. A "by invitation only" wine and cheese party on October 15th netted \$800.

1977

"Early Start to Good Health", a new project aimed at kindergarten through third grade was begun. The program teaches a child awareness and importance of his body. CCWC members approached elementary school principals for approval and then distributed to American Cancer Society materials to the teachers to aid in instruction.

CCWC members took on the **Clearwater Free Clinic** as a project. Registered nurses were able to help the staff and others took care of office work and telephones.

1978

Safety Village became a service project. The Village was operating under the Clearwater Junior Woman's Club, but more manpower was required. CCWC members participated as teachers for the bicycle safety and pedestrian safety classes.

The first **Breakfast Fashion Show** fundraiser was held at Maas Brothers Department Store.

1980

The Clearwater Spouse Abuse Shelter became a service project of the club.

In **April**, CCWC members pledged \$10,000 to the **Lykes Cancer Center** at Morton Plant Hospital. The \$5,000 raised at the Burdine's Opening was taken from the Treasury and the additional \$5000 was given over the next three years. A plaque on the door of a room in Lykes Cancer Center states that Clearwater Community Woman's Club is a donor.

Club member Judy Lutz was elected Second Vice President of the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs.

1981

Participation in the **Meals-on-Wheels** program was begun. Club members deliver meals for one complete route every Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday of the week.

1982

The Women on the Way program was begun at the Junior College. The program teaches survival skills for today's woman.

In **March**, sixteen CCWC members traveled to Tallahassee to observe the legislature in action. They were also entertained at a buffet supper in the home of Mary Grizzie, State Senator. Other members of Congress were present and answered questions. (The trip was repeated in 1989.)

In **September**, the **American Cancer Society's Environmental Lifestyle Study** was undertaken. This is a six-year study, ending in 1988.

1984

In **March**, members of the Home Life Department traveled to **Hacienda Girl's Ranch** for a tour of the facility. CCWC provided support to the Ranch for many years.

On **May** 1st, Judy Lutz was installed as president of the FFWC. Before the installation, members of CCWC were hostesses at a dinner in honor of Judy. Members of District 14 also attended.

Members of the International Affairs Department entertained Japanese visitors form Nagano, Clearwater's sister city, at an afternoon tea.

1986

Participation in the **Very Special Arts Festival** was begun. Members aided handicapped children.

The Public Affairs Department invited all members for a trip to the County Criminal Court Complex.

The Arts Department began summer classes for members and friends in Arts and Crafts including basket-making, quilting, and counted cross-stitch.

1988

In **October**, the **Clearwater Public Library** and CCWC sponsored a lecture/workshop series on budgeting, financial counseling, savings, investments and legal matters, entitled "Take Charge of your Life by Taking Charge of Your Money."

In **November**, the Public Affairs Department held "A Trip to the Dump", where the General Meeting was held at the **Pinellas County** "**Refuse to Energy" Plant**.

1989

Merry June Burwell was named Ms. Clearwater on February 18th. The award was cosponsored by the City of Clearwater and the Greater Clearwater Chamber of Commerce.

Environmentalist Greg Howe spoke to the Conservation Department on Xeriscape and planting with native Florida plants. A social was held with husbands aboard the bay boat Flamingo. Proceeds from ta breakfast fashion show at Countryside Country Club went to the **Center Foundation**.

"Taking Charge of your Life by Taking Charge of Your Money" was presented three times in October in conjunction with the Clearwater Public Library System.

A Christmas Cookie Exchange was held at the home of Peggy Word.

The West Coast Ballet performed at the annual Christmas Luncheon.

1990

At a Centennial Luncheon held with the Woman's Club of Clearwater and Junior Woman's Club, Alice Thalheimer was honored as "Outstanding Member" of CCWC.

A net profit of \$7,230.80 was realized at the Daisy Award Luncheon/Fashion Show. This is the highest amount ever for this fundraiser. The Daisy Award was won by **Habitat for Humanity.**

In **May** at the FFWC Convention, Women of Achievement Awards were received by Alice Thalheimer- 2^{nd} Place in Humanities and Midge Coward – 3^{rd} Place in the Arts.

Programs this year included Attorney Drucilla Bell on "Building Bridges Among Nations"; Life Link Foundation on organ transplants.

In **November**, the Board voted to place Frances Stavros on the **Women in Military Service Memorial Register.**

1991

The first annual Road Rally was held at Dayton Andrews Motors. Profits for \$2198 were given to **Gateway Children's Shelter**.

The Home Life Department assembled 1600 bicycle safety kits for the **"Keep Kids Safe"** project. Kits contain moist towelette, adhesive strip, safety pin and ID tag in a film canister.

CCWC, Junior Woman's and Woman's Club of Clearwater met at a luncheon to honor **READ Pinellas**, the county literary coalition.

The Conservation Department met at the Waste Management Recycling Center and had a program on Bat Preservation.

Ray Aquino spoke with the International Affairs Department on the current medical situation in China.

Education heard Sylvia Franklin talk about her trek in West Virginia in the footsteps of her ancestor.

Renate's Boutique presented the fashions at the Daisy Award Luncheon. Profits form the show was \$4,736.96.

Guided tours during the year included the Morton Plant Hospital Women's Center, Pinellas County Cooperative Extension Xeriscape garden and the Dunedin Art Center.

At the May FFWC Convention, CCWC won 15 awards, highest in the district. President Trudy Yates received an award from Lee Nees for being of most help to a District Director.

The second annual Road Rally raised \$2,500 which was distributed **to Florida Gulf Coast and Dunedin Fine Arts Centers** for their Outreach Education Programs.

1992

A program by a USF graduate student from China was followed by lunch of Chinese foods. Other meetings featured speakers from the Fiber Arts Institute, School System Dropout Prevention Services and Canine Companions.

At the **February** District Arts Festival, CCWC won nine awards (four, including Best in Show, by Sue McClain.) Marte Toohill was named Volunteer of the Year at Clearwater High School. Home Life raised \$164 in a Pinellas Trail Walk-a-thon for Kids Safety Kits. Most of the \$4200 raised at this year's annual Daisy Luncheon went to **Personal Enrichment through Mental Health Services (PEMHS).**

Annual luncheon of the CCWC, Woman's Club of Clearwater and Junior Woman's Club featured Susan Peterson speaking on "Hearts for the Homeless.". Donations totaled \$400.

In **May**, CCWC received nine awards at the FFWC Convention, including the President's Award Plaque for the Bicycle Kit project for kids. Judy Lutz was named President of GFWC Southern Region. Trudy Yates was named to the FFWC Board as Division Chairman of the Education Department.

August luncheon at Pappas acquainted new members with CCWC Board members.

On **November** 13-14, a Book Fair to raise funds for **Reading is Fundamental** program was held at the Main Clearwater Library. Chairman Martie Henderson reported profits of \$3,340. On Preview Night (admission \$10), five local authors were on hand to autograph their books. Silent Auction was held for items donated by comic strip artist Dean Young and for autographed books by Barbara Bush and Norman Schwartzkopf. Saturday was free with clowns and story tellers for children.

1993

In **February**, CCWC won 14 awards at the District Arts Festival. Sue McClain won Best of Show for her pastel and Marian Menzel won Best of Show in cross-stitch. Three club members attended the Annual Child Advocacy Convention in Tallahassee and each wrote a report for published in "The Daisy Chain", the club newsletter.

In **March**, the annual Daisy Award luncheon at Sheraton Sand Key featured fashions from Daffodil Boutique modeled by club members. The award went to the Full Circle Program of the **Clearwater Marine Science Center**. Martie Henderson, Chairman, announced a profit of \$4,970.

At the **April** FFWC Convention, CCWC won ten awards – two first place in the Arts and a Best of Division to Renate Fambri for a decorated basket. Six members helped with Special Olympics. Members toured the St. Pete Fine Arts Museum and also Hacienda Girl's Ranch where items were donated for their thrift shop. HOBY recipient, J. R. Sainario, Pinellas Park High Junior, spoke at a General Meeting. The "Three Club" luncheon - CCWC, Woman's Club of Clearwater and Clearwater Junior Woman's Club – featured basket centerpieces filled with baby items which were donated to **Kimberly Home, Inc**.

May: Judy Lutz spoke on "Leadership" at Countryside Library. The installation luncheon was held at Clearwater Yacht Club. At the District 14 Workshop, Marie Gage was named Chairman of District 14.

August: New member/Board get-acquainted lunch was held at the Flagship Restaurant.

September: In response to a local church request, members collected and sent 20 winter coats and 2 ski pants to Armenia/Soviet Union. Postage was \$115. International Affairs began monthly articles to the "Daisy Chain" explaining different religions of the world.

October: Marie Gage was elected District 14 Director at the Fall Tour of Officers in Bradenton.

November: The 2nd Annual Book Fair at Clearwater Main Library benefitted **Salvation Army Oak Tree Pre-School.** Books from Bookstop were sold. Preview night (Admission \$10) had five authors on hand for signing and silent auction. Members donated refreshments. Clowns, storytellers, and puppets were featured for children on the free Saturday. Chairman Sandy Chochola reported profit of \$2,500.

Members attended Dunedin Art Center lunch/tour.

Reading is Fun/Head Start program was begun. On the third Wednesday of each month through April, three members at each of three Head Start Centers will read and distribute children's books to about sixty 3-4 year olds.

December: Fifteen members toured Decorator Showcase at the Castle at Boot Ranch. Annual Christmas Luncheon was held at Belleview Country Club and featured the Madrigal Singers from Largo High. Donations were accepted for **Mother and Child Care Center of Clearwater.** Annual Cookie Exchange was held and extra cookies were donated to Oak Tree Learning Center. Judy Lutz was named Executive Director of the **Clearwater Free Clinic.**

1994

February: Outstanding program was presented by Dr. Stephen Weinstock, founder of American-Romanian Medical Relief Foundation. At District 14 Art Festival CCWC received eight 1st place, six 2nd place, and Best of Show for Sue McClain's pastel painting. "The Daisy Chain" began publishing minutes of each previous General Meeting.

March: Conservation department and members toured Mote Marine Aquarium in Sarasota. Education department toured Robinson Challenge School. Daisy Award Luncheon hatbox centerpieces under-scored "Hats Off to Women" theme. Profit of about \$5,000 was split with Award winner, Homeless Emergency Project - \$2,100, and PACT \$500, Meals on Wheels \$400, Florida Gulf Coast Art Center \$300, Hacienda Girls' Ranch \$163 and others.

April: At FFWC Convention, Trudy Yates was named to Public Affairs Department in charge of Crime Prevention Division focusing on women. CCWC won seven awards plus five in The Arts.

May: Installation and new member presentation was made at Flagship Restaurant. New District Director, Marie Gage, presided over District 14 Spring meeting at Safety Harbor Spa.

August: New members / Board luncheon was held at Pepper Mill Restaurant.

October: Third Annual Book Fair was held at Clearwater East Branch Library to benefit Greater Clearwater Library Foundation. Admission price was \$10; local authors were on hand to sell and autograph books, members provided refreshments. Profit was about \$4,000. The next day "Jazz by Kids for Kids" was hosted at the Main Library by their staff and club members. Vision Cable filmed the entertainment, which included member Nancy Hinrichs as a clown.

November: Arts Department and Club members toured Designer Showcase and, later in the month, the Dunedin Art Center.

December: Christmas Luncheon was held at Belleair Country Club. Joy Katzen-Guthrie presented a program on the music of Christmas with its history as she sang and played music. The cookie exchange was held at the home of Peggy Word with extra donated to YWCA's Clearwater Child Care Center.

1995

January: Public Affairs Department toured Pinellas County Criminal Courts. Judge Downes spoke on local courts. The Arts Department had 37 members tour the "Treasures of Czars."

February: Best of Show was won by Sue McClain at District 14 Arts Festival. International Affairs Department had a hat show by Ginger Corbin with hats she has collected worldwide.

March: Education Department had a dinner meeting with speaker on Pinellas County's Blueprint 2000. International Affairs had a trip to "Splendid China". Tallahassee Legislative Days were attended by Marguerite Blackwood and Marie Gage who sat in on committee meetings. A Centennial celebration skit was presented at the General Meeting and in April for the Junior Woman's Club. International Affairs couples' dinner featured a speaker on IESC and Ukraine.

April: Four club Centennial "Hats and Gloves" Tea at the Countryside Country Club, Judy Lutz speaker. Annual Daisy Award Lunch at Sheraton Sand Key, "Spring Fashion – and All That Jazz" featured Pat Lokey Fashions, Webb's Gentlemen's Apparel, and entertainment by Paulette Pepper and the Garden Avenue Seven. Proceeds of \$3,756 went to: Elfun Society (winner) \$2,111, \$500each to Free Clinic and Meals on Wheels, \$100 each to Canine Companions, Pinellas Seabird Rehab, Florida Gulf Coast Art children's program, Aids Coalition, Hacienda Girls Ranch, Juniorettes, and \$50 each to Countryside and Clearwater High Grad parties.

May: Won two first places in "Adopt-a-Library" at GFWC Convention. Conservation Department (14 members) visited Tampa's new Aquarium. Education Department toured Pinellas Technical School.

July: President Martie Henderson designed a new club logo and put it in use. Sandy Chochola introduced new "Daisy Chain" format.

September: Clearwater Free Clinic and RCS Food Pantry were added to Meals on Wheels project. GFWC CCWC Dual Membership By-Law change was approved. Best Project Trophy for Adopt a Library was presented to CCWC at Fall Board.

October: "Jazz for Kids by Kids was again held at Clearwater Main Library with face painting, crafts, storytelling, balloon sculptures, and musical entertainment by several local youth groups.

November: Proceeds (approximately \$3,000) from the Annual Book Fair at Clearwater East Library went to the Greater Clearwater Foundation for purchase of children's books. Elven authors autographed and sold books; wine and hors d'œuvres were provided by members; admission price was \$10.

1996

January: International Department visited St. Petersburg Museum of Arts to see Egyptian Collection.

February: Five members served lunch at Opening of the men's dorm and Thrift Store at Everybody's Tabernacle. Home Life Department observed four adaption proceedings, one domestic violence case in Judge Richard Luce's Court. CCWC Art winners entered and won awards at District Arts Festival.

March: Conservation Department toured Clearwater Marine Science Center. Annual Daisy Luncheon was at Innisbrook Resort where 297 enjoyed "Broadway on the Runway", fashions by Renate's Boutique and Webb's Gentlemen Apparel, music by "Pepper and Fine Thyme", singer Claudette Pepper. Net profit of \$5,202 was allotted to: Isaiah's Inn (\$3,000) for housing homeless families and individuals, Meals on Wheels (\$500), Florida Orchestra (\$400) and \$50 each to grad parties at Countryside and Clearwater High Schools.

April: FFWC Convention honored 25 years Club Clearwater. Martie Henderson was installed as District 14 Director, Marie Gage as Chaplain. Ten members of Arts Department toured "Splendors of Egypt". Education Department toured Frontier Elementary School which has extended school year and its own TV station.

May: Installation Lunch was held at Bon Appetit Restaurant. Three Dual Members were admitted during the year. Members volunteered 12,000 service hours and donated a total of \$9,000 to the community.

September: CCWC celebrated its 25th anniversary at the home of Berta Honey. Of the 64 who attended, 15 were Charter Members.

October: Jazz for Kids by Kids was again held at the Main Library. Charley Groth presented a free class on true Jazz. Children made hats, musical instruments, enjoyed free live jazz performances.

November: Annual Book Fair was held at Clearwater East Library. The \$10 ticket provided wine, hors d'œuvres, and opportunity to meet nine local authors who autographed their

books. Proceeds of \$4,500 were donated to Greater Clearwater Library Foundation. A record number of CCWC members attended the annual Dunedin Fine Arts Luncheon.

December: Wind songs from Clearwater High were the program at the Christmas Luncheon.

1997

February: At District 14 Arts Festival, Carol Caseber won first place for machine quilting and Trudy Yates won two first places for hand quilting and floral arranging.

March: "Greatest Show on the Runway" was the theme for the annual Daisy Award Luncheon held at Innisbrook. Fashions were from Stein Mart, and music by Florida Brass Quintet. Net profit of \$6,000 was divided between Award Winner, Clearwater Free Clinic, and others.

October: CCWC sponsored a Kids' Jazz Fest at the Harborview Center. Gibbs High School Vocal and Jazz Ensemble entertained; other free events included instrument making and a jazz clinic for ages elementary through college.

November: "An Evening with the Author" was held at the East Library featuring thirteen local authors, wine and gourmet food for a \$10 donation. Net proceeds of \$450 benefitted Greater Clearwater Library Foundation.

1998

January: Art Department program featured Sharon Drenner on "Understanding Prints."

February: Students of Model UN Club of Schiller University provided International Department's program. At the District 14 Art Festival, Sue McClain won Best of Show for her collage. Blue ribbons were won by Trudy Yates for crafts and photography, Marguerite Blackwood for photography.

March: Nine club members visited Tallahassee legislative session and toured historic buildings.

April: Sandee Pfister, CCWC, and Eve Bemett, Stein Mart, directed "Hollywood on the Runway" for the 27th Daisy Award Luncheon at Innisbrook. Music featured Pepper & Fine Thyme and big band singing start Connie Haines. Net profits of \$8,454 were distributed to: North Suncoast Florida Orchestra (Daisy Award Winner) \$4,500, Fixed Projects \$1,315, Casa \$300, Quest Inn \$200, and \$535 each to Meals on Wheel, The Haven, Food Pantry, and Clearwater Free Clinic.

May: New officers were installed May 19th at a luncheon at Bon Appetit.

June: CCWC member Judy Lutz was elected and sworn in as First VP of GFWC at its international Convention in New Orleans.

October: Public Affairs Department presented a political debate – issue "Should trial judges be elected or appointed?" Debaters were St Pete Times favorites Martin Dyckman and Howard Troxler. A political picnic-style lunch followed.

November: "An Evening with the Authors" was held at Clearwater East Library featuring Florida authors autographing their books, a silent auction and complimentary wine and gourmet refreshments. Donations were brought to the General Meeting for the Haven's Gift Box Project and for the Christmas Shoe Box operation.

December: The Holiday Luncheon was held at the Belleair Country Club with entertainment by Largo High School Madrigal Singers. Gifts were brought for Stepping Stones mothers.

1999

January: Guests wore white from head to toe at a Home Life Social. "January White Luncheon", at the home of Betty Lang.

February: CCWC members received seven first place ribbons at the District 14 Arts Festival.

March: 28th Annual Daisy Award Fashion Show and Luncheon was held at the Belleview Biltmore Hotel. Member Sandee Pfister directed the production, "A Celebration of a Century of Fashion & Music" with fashions by Stein Mart. Musical group Dazzler and vocalists Nuala, Jan Crockett Hunter and Arthur Murray dancers performed. The Visitation Center of CASA (Citizens Against Spouse Abuse), winner of the Daisy Award received \$4,000. Remainder of the \$9,032 net proceeds was disbursed among 12 other non-profit organizations.

April: Conservation Department sponsored a tour of Weedon Island.

May: The 1999 Florida Library Association's Library Service Enhancement Award, awarded to CCWC, and was presented to Marella Cassels in St. Augustin. At the CCWC installation luncheon at the Bon Appetit restaurant, Marella Cassels was installed as president for a second term.

November: Thirteen local authors participated in "An Evening with the Authors" at Clearwater East Library. A Silent Auction supplemented the book signing and sales. Complimentary wine and gourmet refreshments were served. Net proceeds of \$4,573 were donated to benefit the Greater Clearwater Library Foundation.

December: The Holiday Luncheon was held at the Belleair Country Club. A Cookie Exchange Afternoon Tea was held at the home of Peggy Word.

January: The Arts Department presented the CCWC Art Festival – speaker Joyce Scalzo.

February: Conservation Department featured the Suncoast Seabird Sanctuary as their program at the General Meeting and in March sponsored a tour of Sanctuary facilities and a picnic. CCWC members won six 1st place, three 2nd place and three 3rd place ribbons at the District 14 Art Show.

March: A \$50 donation was approved for a 10"x10" tile in the new entryway of the Clearwater Marine Science Center. CCWC will be imprinted. Three CCWC members attended Legislative Days in Tallahassee.

April: 29th Annual Daisy Fashion Show was held in the Harborview Center. Fashions by Stein Mart. Member Sandee Pfister directed the production. CCWC presented "A Passport to Fashion" as the theme. A musical Voyage to the Millennium starred Pepper & Fie Thyme and featured recording artist Pete Brady. Upper Pinellas Interfaith Volunteer Care Givers (UPIVC), Daisy Award winner received \$4,000 and a plaque. Reminder of the \$10,069.85 proceeds was disbursed among 11other non-profit organizations. At the General Meeting Rick Grajirene spoke to "Doing Business in Russia."

May: Education and International Affairs Departments sponsored joint cutting to Schiller international University in Dunedin. The spring Installation Luncheon was held at Countryside Country Club.

June: Newly installed CCWC president Petey Henning attended the GFWC 109th Convention in Boston and cast CCWC's vote for Judy Lutz as GSWC president-elect. On June 6, CCWC sponsored a community forum on Clearwater Downtown Redevelopment with 100 attendees.

September: New Yearbooks were introduced. A thirty-year tradition ended when a new, larger, user-friendly yearbook was introduced complete with email addresses. Seven members attended FFWC Fall Board. Members were saddened by the death of Lilian Vollmer.

October: An "Effective Mentoring Strategies" workshop was presented by CCWC in cooperation with the Pinellas County School Board, CJWC and Countryside High School. International Affairs Department celebrated World Food Day by collecting food donations at the General Meeting for the RCS Food Pantry.

November: CCWC honored members Fran Johansen and Mary Blackmon with a membership in WIMSA, Women in Military Services in America, for their service during W.W.II. An Evening with the Authors netted \$4,919.56 for the Clearwater Library Foundation.

December: Thousands of people viewed the beautiful "Light up a Child's Life" holiday tree created by the artist CCWC members for the Festival of Trees. Members enjoyed a tour and lunch at the Dunedin Art Center and the Holiday Luncheon at Carlouel Yacht Club. Sharon Olipant and Mary Jacobs, chairpersons of GFWC FFWC President's Project, outlined the three faceted project: 1) service projects around the state, 2) financial stability and to raise funds to improve state headquarters, 3) increase the club's identity.

2011

She also explained that Grace House is an 8-week program helping families with children to become self-sufficient. The book, Evicted: Poverty and Profit in the American City, a 2017 Pulitzer Prize winner for non-fiction, was a suggested informative source.

October: Karen Seel, the featured speaker, encouraged the club members to renew the Penny for Pinellas sales tax for the next 10 years. So much has been accomplished since its introduction. (It passed.) The meeting was hosted by the Public Issues CSP. Six of our members walked proudly behind our Club Banner in the Alzheimer's Walk on October 28, and many more donated. CCWC teamed with RCS to urge the Mayor to make October "Domestic Violence Awareness Month." Our member Judy Lutz, past GFWC President, was presented her 50-Membership Recognition Pin in a congratulatory letter from President Kay Estock.

November: The Education CSP introduced Terry Fortner, granddaughter of the author of Yesterday I Lived in Paradise and the Caladesi Cookbook. Claudia Arcabascio, 2nd VP, announced that plans were progressing for the Daisy Fashion Show. 3rd VP Rosemary Keller inducted Debbie Foley into CCWC. We were our own entertainment this year: a Christmas trivia game and the singing of "The Twelve Days of Christmas." The Volunteer of the Year Award was presented to Martha Hickey, our photographer and producer of the District 14 Newsletter.

2018

January: Our talented members brought in their arts, crafts and photographs to be judged by Sue Benjamin and Syd Entel from the Syd Entel Gallery in Safety Harbor. Members moving on to the District 14 Arts and Crafts competition in February were Nan Shane, Marge Leavy, Irmi Karpinski, Martha Hickey, Monique DeSart, Joan Yunker and Lucile Casey. A table was set up with art supplies for members to create valentines to be delivered to residents at a retirement home. WOW awards were presented to Nancy Hughes for December and Susan Luce for January. Both ladies give a lot of time and effort to making CCWC great. A delicious lunch was served by the Arts CSP.

February: The meeting was held at the Countryside Library and hosted by the Home Life CSP. Amanda Wood of the Alzheimer's Association spoke of the ten warning signs of Alzheimer's and the importance of early diagnosis. Nancy Hughes presented Amanda with a \$50 check to the Alzheimer's Assn. from CCWC. Treasurer Susan Luce announced that via a chip reader the club will now accept credit cards. Irmi Karpinski has been asked to attend the LEADS weekend. CCWC will donate \$4,000 (from AWA funds) to the Clearwater Library Foundation to be used for the Book Bash. May: At the May Installation Luncheon, Virginia Papadopolous, District 14 Director, installed new officers for 2018-2019. Virginia presented each with a candy bar appropriate for her new office as she described the basic duties. 3rd VP Rosemary Keller installed Khris Turpin as a new member of CCWC. The CCWC membership is pleased to have Khris as a member. On behalf of the membership, Lucile presented gifts of appreciation to Kay for her leadership, positive changes to move the club forward, and her boundless energy to move us to be the best CCWC members. Kay's motto for 2018-2019 is "Creating Smiles by Changing Lives."

June / July / August: The "Summer Lunch Bunch" again enjoyed fellowship and good food. In June Mary Ellen Bader hosted the club at Clear Sky Restaurant. The Palm Pavilion at Clearwater Beach was a fun location in July. Some of the ladies took the ferry to get to the beach. Susan Luce and Lucile Casey were our hostesses. The final Lunch Bunch of the summer took place at Carmel Restaurant, planned by Virginia Papadopoulos, our District Director.

September: On September 11 a social was held to introduce prospective new members to the club. Rosemary Keller, membership chair, is following up with those who have indicated interest. The first meeting of the year under President Kay Estock was hosted by the Board of Directors. Our speaker was LaShante Keys from Empath Health. He thanked CCWC for the grant to Healing Healthy Hearts Camp and shared many functions of Empath Health. We will soon be unveiling a new logo to make sure everyone knows who we are and what we do.

October: Laura Donnelly from GFWC North Pinellas Woman's Club presented information on Operation Smile, a program to fund surgeries for children born with cleft palates. We need donations of toothbrushes, toothpaste, etc. Kay presented our new logo with a daisy design, including our new slogan of "Women Making a Difference." Virginia Papadopoulos, Director of District 14, installed the new Executive Board for 2019-2020: President – Susan Luce, 1st VP – Irmi Karpinski, 2nd VP – Martha Hickey, 3rd VP – Dena Colgan, Treasurer – Sue Meier, Recording Secretary – Debbie Foley, Corresponding Secretary – Dottie Stutler, Member at Large – Ann Brewer.

June / July / August: The "Summer Lunch Bunch" had their first gathering on June 18 at Clear Sky on Cleveland, followed by a very interesting and informative tour of Kimberly House. On July 16 we met at PF Chang's in Countryside, reservations having been taken by Pat Plumlee. After our delicious Chinese lunch, Dena Colgan announced that the gathering for potential new members will be held at the newly opened Clearwater Historical Society on September10. Delightful entertainment was provided by violinists from Our Lady of Lourdes Elementary School, one being the granddaughter of our member and former President, Kay Estock. 2020

March: Due to the Corona Virus, the meeting was cancelled. The Conservation CSP would have normally planted a tree during their month, but instead they donated \$50 to the Arbor Foundation. October: At the general meeting (via Zoom), Terri Lipsey Scott, director of the Woodson African American Museum, spoke about the Black perspective on the women's suffrage movement. At the Walk to End Alzheimer's, club members raised thousands of dollars.

November: The Arts and Culture committee made ornaments for the annual Festival of Trees benefiting the ARC charity, which serves the disabled community. The Environment committee brought recycling bins to the Kimberly Home and taught residents which items to recycle. The speaker at the general meeting was Jennifer Obermaier, Library Director for the city of Clearwater, who also became a member of CCWC.

December: Officer James Frederick, Jr. of the Clearwater Police Department spoke to the group about police programs that support community non-profits. Food and gifts were donated to The Haven (domestic violence shelter), the Kimberly Home, Salvation Army and Meals on Wheels. 2021

Committees continued their activities, including book club, storm drains painted by the Juniorettes, an Earth Day celebration by the Environment committee and a trip to Toymakers of Eastlake's shop by the Arts and Culture committee.
